- Assign chores with the understanding that doing them is for the betterment of the family.
- **Welcome involvement of role models. Kids should spend time with significant adults other than their parents.**

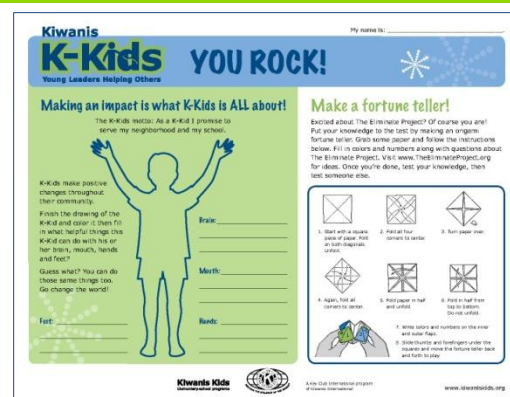

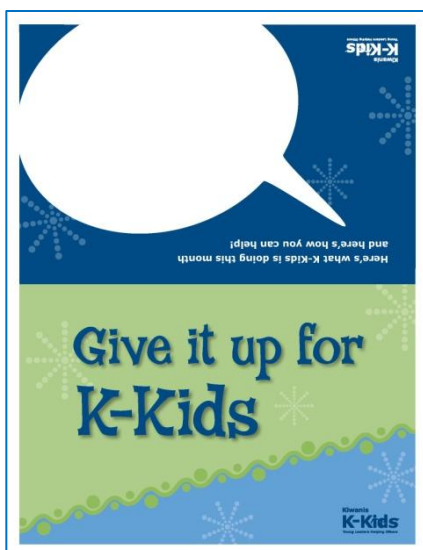

Promoting school-wide K-Kids projects

Our club submitted contest entries, what's next?

Here's what happens during the K-Kids contest judging process. K-Kids clubs mail contest entries to their Kiwanis Kids district administrator. The district administrator organizes a committee that judges contest submissions for each category and awards a first, second and third place district winner. District winners receive certificates.

The first place district winner within each category is forwarded on to Kiwanis International. Kiwanis International staff judge international submissions and award first, second and third place overall winners for each category in mid-May. Kiwanis International mails recognition items to the Kiwanis district administrator for presentation.

Some district administrators invite contest winners to attend a Kiwanis district event where recognition is presented. If this isn't possible the contest winner will be recognized by the Kiwanis advisor at a K-Kids club meeting, or during a Kiwanis club meeting.
